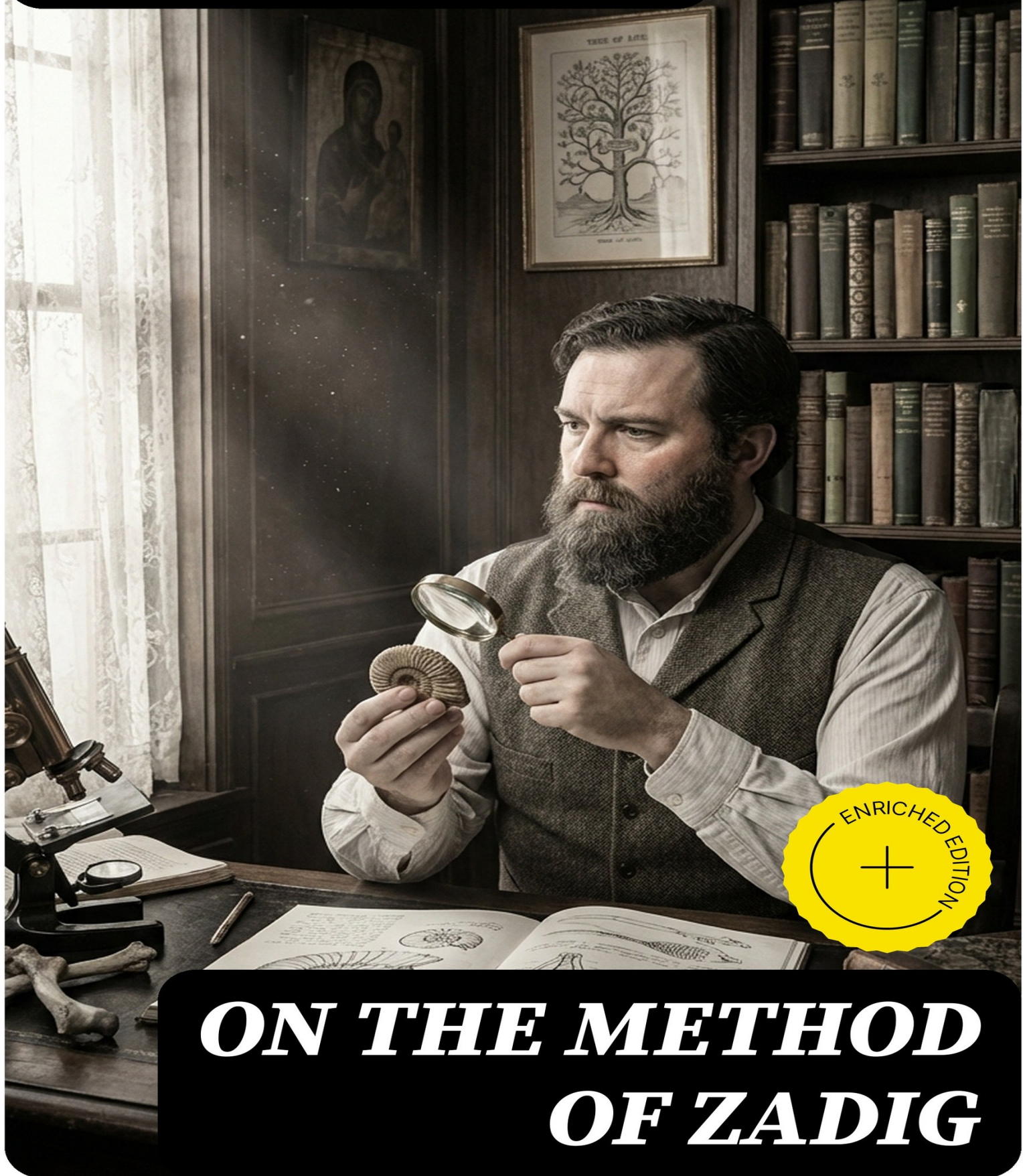

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Introduction

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At the heart of Thomas Henry Huxley's *On the Method of Zadig* lies the exhilarating and disquieting idea that the world can be read backward—that from faint traces and scattered fragments a disciplined mind may reconstruct vanished events, navigating the narrow ridge between audacious inference and scrupulous restraint, embracing probability without pretending to omniscience, and testing each imaginative leap against the stubborn grain of evidence until the once invisible stands forth with a clarity earned not by revelation but by patient, methodical attention to signs that, properly understood, point beyond themselves to causal histories we can justify, refine, and responsibly act upon.

Composed in the late nineteenth century by the English biologist and essayist Thomas Henry Huxley, this piece is a work of popular science and epistemology, an elegant lecture-essay that addresses a broad public. Its title alludes to Voltaire's protagonist *Zadig*, whose feats of keen observation Huxley repurposes as an emblem for scientific reasoning. Rather than advancing new data, he reflects on method, showing how the habits of trained investigators convert apparently trivial marks into credible narratives about nature's past. The essay belongs to a Victorian moment when science sought not only discoveries but also persuasive accounts of how knowledge is responsibly made.
