




TO GENERAL ASPOTTER'S GUIDE

EXCELLENT BRITISH STUFF

CATERHAM

Ever since the company was established in the 1970s, all Caterhams have been based around the same basic platform: Lotus's old 'Seven', a no-frills, rear-wheel drive sports car. But this doesn't mean Caterhams are old and boring: the hottest versions – including the insane R500 – are among the wildest cars in the world!

BUG-EYED LIGHTS

Stick out on stalks like a shocked chameleon!

NO ROOF

Some Caterhams have a flimsy bit of cloth to protect against the rain, but most are proudly roof-free!





ASTON MARTIN



They're probably the most beautiful cars on the planet, and so cool that even James Bond drives one! Some people complain that all Astons look the same... but when they're as pretty as this, is that really a bad thing?

HOW TO SPOT ONE

THE BADGE

Check the boot lid for one of these!



If you're thinking, 'Urgh, that's a bit ugly', then you're not looking at an Aston. Everything this company makes is STUNNING.

BIG BONNET

All Astons are frontengined, with either a V8 or V12 churning out lots of power and noise!

A FEW YOU MIGHT SEE



DBS

Roaring V12 supercar, as driven – and crashed – by James Bond in Casino Royale.



A sleek two-seater with a brawny V8 engine, the V8 Vantage is the most popular Aston Martin on the road. Comes in coupé and convertible flavours.



ONE-77

It costs over a million pounds. It has a 7.0-litre V12 engine. It'll remain one of the rarest sights on the road: just seventy-seven were built, of which just a couple remain in Britain. Pity.

The very best of British luxury. Since 1906,

HOW TO SPOT ONE

HOOD ORNAMENT

The figure found on every Rolls-Royce bonnet is called 'The Spirit Of Ecstasy'.

UPRIGHT GRILLE

Rolls-Royces are famous for their big, spangly grilles, which are tall and shiny with vertical slats.

ENORMOUS

Rolls-Royces dwarf everything else on the road. The modern Phantom measures nearly six metres in length!



PHANTOM

The biggest, poshest and most expensive Rolls. Costs over quarter of a million pounds, weighs nearly three tonnes!

Old, elegant, unruffled - just the sort of car that James May would own. In fact, James May DOES own this car!



LOTUS

Back in the 1960s, Lotus founder Colin Chapman coined the company's motto: simplify, then add lightness. And Lotus is still doing ? it today: making super-light, super-agile sports cars that are big on entertainment but short on luxury!



HOW TO SPOT ONE

RACING GREEN

Britain's traditional race shade is the most popular colour headlights and for Lotuses. Also watch out for blue, yellow and orange.

SNAKE EYES

Modern Lotuses have drawn-back gaping mouths. Not pretty, but effective.

AGILE

Lotuses are generally a few hundred kilos lighter than their competitors, so expect to see them darting around the road like dragonflies!
