

Introduction

In Rottweilers For Dummies, you'll be introduced to all the good, the bad, and the ugly that surrounds the breed. Too many books written about purebred dogs do nothing but try to convince you that the breed is not only faultless but suitable for every household in America (or anywhere else in the world for that matter). I seldom find this to be true of any breed, and I know this doesn't describe the Rottweiler. So you won't find me twisting your arm and trying to convince you that a Rottweiler is right for you. In fact, if anything, I'm as honest as possible about this challenging breed. That way, if you're still eager to get one of these wonderful dogs, you'll be prepared for any drawbacks and able to handle them well.

Rottweilers are one of the smartest, most trainable breeds I have ever known. Not only is the Rottweiler capable of learning just about everything any other breed can master, the Rottie also has the energy, the strength, and the enthusiasm to carry it all off. A Rottie is smart, affectionate, protective, and easy-going around those he loves.

Along with all those perfect dog qualities I've attributed to the Rottweiler, there are a few drawbacks. Among them is the fact that those same qualities have made the Rottweiler one of the most popular breeds in the world. The breed's popularity, as well as population, have

soared over the past decade. This popularity puts the breed into the hands of people who are completely incapable of providing the training and care a Rottweiler needs.

The Rottweiler whose owner has neglected training is nothing but a big nuisance. Without the proper training, a Rottweiler can become an unruly brute. A Rottweiler wants — and needs — a leader in his life. If an owner doesn't provide that leadership, the Rottie assumes the role himself, and a Rottweiler acting on his own volition can be difficult — if not downright dangerous.

The information in *Rottweilers For Dummies* will help you decide if you should even consider taking on the responsibility of Rottweiler ownership. If the answer is yes, you'll find plenty of valuable information, tips, and suggestions that will assist you and your Rottie along the road to a mutually delightful relationship.

So Who Am I?

Nothing in this book came by way of divine inspiration. Everything in *Rottweilers For Dummies* is the result of my own years of trial and error with purebred dogs or through the kind intervention of my many mentors through the years.

My interest in purebred dogs goes back as far as I can remember and has led me through practically every facet of these wonderful animals: breeding, exhibiting, professional handling, publishing, writing, and judging. All that experience has also assisted me in presenting lectures to dog fanciers around the world.

For over 30 years, I owned and published *Kennel Review Magazine*, and doing so associated me with some of the most learned dog men and women the world over. As a breeder/exhibitor, using the Beau Monde kennel prefix, I have bred nearly 100 American Kennel Club champions in a number of different breeds.

My judging assignments have taken me to practically every major dog showing country in the world, which has given me the opportunity to judge Rottweilers in almost every instance. I now judge for the American Kennel Club, the Canadian Kennel Club, and the United Kennel Club in North America.

How This Book Is Organized

Rottweilers For Dummies is divided into five parts. If you're just starting to think about getting a Rottweiler, try starting out with Chapter 1. If you already own a Rottweiler and have a specific question or problem, dive into the chapter that best suits your needs right now.

Part I: Getting to Know Rottweilers

In this part, you'll get a feel for Rottweilers as a breed. Then you'll set about to determine whether a Rottweiler is right for you. Everyone's needs and personalities are different, and before you head out to the nearest breeder to find a Rottweiler pup, you owe it to yourself and the dog you may bring home to do some serious soulsearching.

Part II: Searching for Your Soul Mate

The chapters in this part are geared toward helping you figure out what you actually want in a Rottweiler. You may be sure a Rottweiler is right for you. But Rotties vary just like people do. So knowing your lifestyle and priorities is just as important at this stage in the game as it is in determining what breed you want.

You also need to know where to look for your new best friend. So I guide you through the process of finding a reputable breeder and tell you which ones to steer clear of altogether.

Finally, you get to the fun stuff: picking out a puppy. Sometimes looking at the pups in a litter makes you want to bring them *all* home. So in this part I let you know which traits to look for in a puppy, physically and emotionally.

Part III: Living with a Rottweiler

In this part, you plan ahead so that you have all the toys and tools you'll need before that plump little pup arrives. And you also get tips on introducing your Rottweiler pup to his new home. Finally, no puppy would be a puppy without the need for training. So you'll figure out which behaviors to start working on with your Rottweiler from the very first day. And you'll also get tips on which behaviors your dog should know as he grows into adulthood. You even get suggestions for going the extra mile with your dog and going through more formal obedience training with a professional trainer.

Living with a Rottweiler? Here I make it one of life's greatest joys.
